Nature of support
<p>The government offers funding to tackle inequalities between children on free school meals and their peers called the pupil premium. Pupil Premium funding supports pupils who are currently eligible for free school meals, or who have been eligible for free school meals at any point in the last six years.</p> <p>For the academic year 2019/20 our pupil premium funding was £217,640 which we allocated to the following areas:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Additional Y3 teacher has been increased in year 3 from 1 to 3 days a week.</li> <li>• Maintained TA support within school for this academic year.</li> <li>• Additional Y6 teacher has been maintained, teaching x4 mornings per week in year 6.</li> <li>• Delivery of daily and weekly small group intervention programmes.</li> <li>• Delivery of the nurture programmes ‘fun friends’ and ‘friends for life’.</li> <li>• Delivery of the Kidsafe programme.</li> <li>• Subsidised educational experiences in and out of school alongside subsidised transport to and from these experiences.</li> <li>• A school based attendance / pastoral officer has been employed for a further year.</li> <li>• Specific motivational rewards linked to attendance purchased and allocated.</li> </ul>

**Due to the coronavirus pandemic, like all schools nationally we closed in March 2020. During lockdown we supported our disadvantaged pupils through home learning, both on line and in paper formats. Laptops were provided for LAC pupils to enable home learning. A small number of our disadvantaged pupils accessed our key worker group during lockdown. When school reopened to identified year groups in March, disadvantaged pupils who did not return continued to receive weekly home learning and welfare telephone calls.**

Focus of PPG spending

2019-20 Pupil Premium Funding:

<p>Additional Y3 teacher increased to 3 days a week.</p> <p>Increased TA support within school delivering daily or weekly intervention programmes to ensure good or better pupil progress and attainment.</p> <p>Additional year 6 teacher for 4 mornings a week.</p> <p>Targeted children completed the nurture programmes 'fun friends' in EYFS and KS1 and 'friends for life' in KS2.</p> <p>Children eligible for PP complete an intensive nurture group for 12 weeks using Kidsafe programme.</p>	<p><b>Due to school closure during the coronavirus pandemic end of year assessments did not take place however spring data has been used when describing impact:</b></p> <p>In year 3 children entitled to pupil premium benefited from small group teacher led intervention in reading, writing and maths. The attainment gap reduced in maths by -20%.</p> <p>Targeted intervention programmes were delivered as identified through high quality data analysis. In addition phonics was delivered to small targeted groups in EYFS, Y1 and Y2.</p> <p>Spring data reports from maths demonstrated narrowing of gaps in years 2,3,4 and 5.</p> <p>50% of more able children entitled to pupil premium in year 6 are on track for GDS.</p> <p>Children completed child voice tasks for LAC and CP reviews, all demonstrating increased resilience to challenges at home. Observations indicated targeted children work hard and persevere with their learning.</p>
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<p>Subsidised experiences in and out of school within school time for all children entitled to pupil premium. Alongside subsidised transport to and from these experiences.</p> <p>Employ our own attendance officer for a further year to work in school and target some of her time towards PA children in receipt of pupil premium.</p> <p>Specific motivational rewards linked to attendance.</p>	<p>All disadvantaged children accesses subsidised visits and transport across all year groups in school.</p> <p>Persistent absence of PP children is quickly identified and our attendance officer works closely with families and Early Help services to support and challenge parents where needed. Parents/Carers continue to be accountable to explain all absence from school.</p>
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## Measuring the impact of PPG spending

The impact of that expenditure on pupil premium children was as follows:

- All children received targeted support with small group core subject intervention sessions in conjunction with a whole school nurture provision enabling children to be ready to learn. This targeted provision was most successful for pupils within maths, enabling them to narrow the gap with other pupils. However, with a national lockdown resulting in many children missing 6 months of education in school, a recovery curriculum for our disadvantaged pupils will be a priority for academic year 2020/2021.
